Kathy grew up near Chicago in an area with significant natural areas, which she enjoyed immensely, getting an Associate Degree in Horticulture and Landscape Design at the Morton Arboretum, located near where she lived. This Arboretum bears certain similarities to our McBryde Garden although it is much bigger. Our gardens were a factor in her eventual decision to move to the Garden Island. As her horizons expanded, Kathy became dedicated to the truth that everything is related to everything else and that we as humans must internalize that truth and act on it.

Living on an acre of land near Chicago for many years, Kathy became used to plants and trees native to the area and generally did her best to conserve resources surrounding her. It was not necessarily a focus shared by those around her.

Frequent visitors to Kauai, she and her husband Ken moved here in 2013 because they found many like-minded people and treasured local stories of interconnection of people with their surroundings as part of the culture. Or as it might be said locally, "Take care of everything you've got or you won't have it".

Ken and Kathy live in Kalaheo on a hillside they are working with to provide space for them to plant local trees and other plants. Occasional worship attendees at HUCC, they are well worth spending a few minutes talking to. They have three cats including the Maine Coon cat Belden, who – at 30 lbs. – may just be the biggest feline on Kauai.

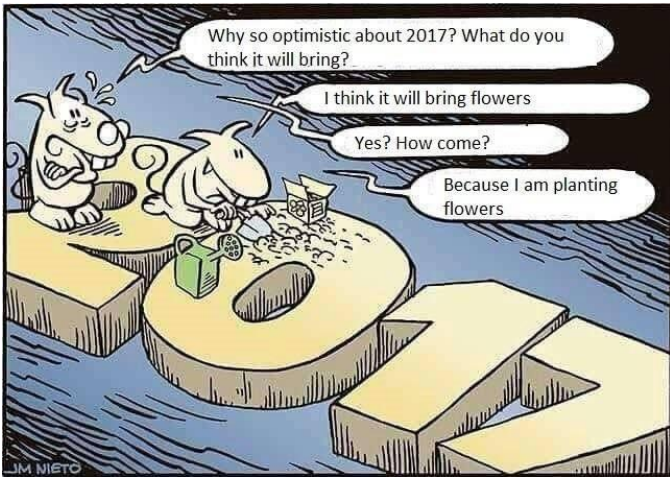

Caring for 'Aina can be as simple as cleaning an infrequently used item and storing it to be used again. Each New Year brings the task of taking down our decorations and storing them for next year.

Any ornament/decoration you will not be using for next year might find a home with The Festival of Lights organization. They also accept plastic bottles that fit their plans for next year's display. Take a quick picture of what you want to discard and send it to me by text or e-mail. I will send all photos to the coordinator for review. Who knows your photo may inspire the theme for next

year and as a side benefit we reduce castoffs going to our landfill and potentially out of the ocean.

As all of you are aware of we live on a small island and as a result we have built homes, churches, stores, schools and hospitals. Roads and parking spaces are essential ingredients when we visit friends/family, attend church, buy goods, take our children/grandchildren to school and keep healthy. Let's face it our roads/driveways need constant repairs and that takes more asphalt and concrete. Ever wonder where all the worn/damaged material goes or where the new material comes from?

Fortunately for us the re-surfaced roads are partially made from crushed old asphalt and concrete. Pacific Concrete Cutting & Coring (PCCC) is a local company that recycles both asphalt and concrete for residents and businesses. In 2016 they diverted from our landfill 17,886 tons which was 12% of the total solid waste generated within our county. This diversion truly benefits our 'Aina. We need less space in our landfill, spend less tax dollars on purchasing/shipping new material and consume less fossil fuel in the process.

PCCC charges residents \$ 25/ton as a drop off fee (you haul the material). They also provide estimates to demolish and haul asphalt or concrete for small or large residential or commercial projects. Consider them as a resource for recycling spent asphalt or concrete. They are located in Lihue at (808) 245-7171 on 1543 Haleukana St. [www.pccchawaii.com](http://www.pccchawaii.com) Mahalo!

## REMEMBERING HENRY OPUKAHA'IA

The third Sunday in February is Henry Opukaha'ia Sunday. On this Sunday we remember a young boy on the island of Hawaii, watching as his family was brutally murdered. We admire his spirit at age 16, as he made his way aboard the *Triumph*. Two years later that ship docked in New York and his journey with the English language and discovering a Christian God began.

Opukaha'ia's dream was to return to the islands and share the good news of Jesus with the Hawaiian people, but his life was cut short at age 26. His life did inspire other Hawaiian missionaries, however, who volunteered to carry the message back to the islands.

We honor Opukaha'ia on this special Sunday by receiving an offering which helps to support prospective and current pastors in the UCC. You may give cash or checks to HUCC with a note designating

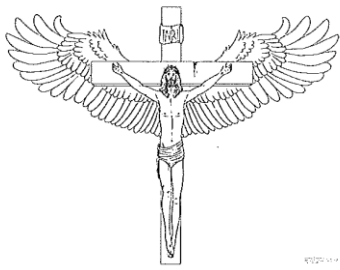

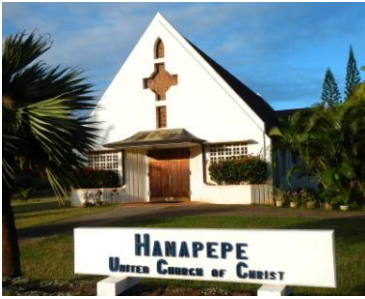

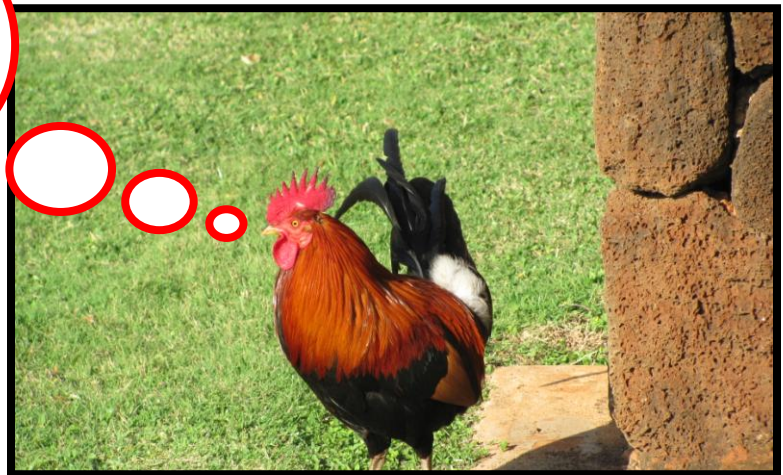
